Ann Morton Making Right



Morton's work exploits traditional fiber techniques as conceptual tools for aesthetic, social communication. She explores themes of assumed entitlements, homogenization, marginalization, and human obsolescence - social divides we've come to accept as normal cultural paradigms. In questioning this acceptance, her work recognizes what is deemed insignificant - marginalized found objects and disenfranchised people. Driven by a desire to make right, her work orchestrates the hand making of community members through public interventions that seek to socially engage the hands of many to create a larger whole.

Tracing Morton's artistic journey, she will share many of the milestones that have influenced a transition from a traditional studio art practice to the infusion of a socially engaged art practice.

Focused primarily on issues surrounding homelessness and societal acceptance of this condition, Morton will review how she employs traditional textile techniques as tools for engagement, and how her work has followed the issues and treatment of chronic homelessness to bring broader awareness through creative community interventions.

Toward a Decolonial Feminist Operating System for Digital Rhetoric Studies



Haas will present a prototype of a decolonial feminist operating system (DFOS) that simultaneously interfaces decolonial and technofeminist algorithms for responding to para-colonial and patriarchal events, tasks, bugs, and hackers that deny and devalue the diversity of bodies and embodied experiences in relation to and with technologies. A DFOS allows users to acknowledge, investigate, critique, and predict the persistent and troubled relationships between colonialism and techno-rhetorics. In this talk, she will install a DFOS to interrupt how our discipline rhetorically computes three common digital rhetoric metaphors--information ecology, digital natives, and digital immigrants--and to access data and memory that challenges users to reflect on which embodied agents inhabiting which ecologies have been worthy of our attention.

Carol Mattingly Hidden Literacy Habits

By 1840, U. S. Catholic women had created 119 sites of literacy in the United States in convents, academies, day schools and orphanages, devoting themselves to the making of institutions in support of women's learning. "Hidden Literacy Habits" looks at a period about which we have a dearth of information regarding women's literacy and rhetorical practices; specifically, this presentation examines the manuals sisters created for new teachers to assure effective teaching and the literacy materials they constructed for active learning and effective rhetorical knowledge among girls in their schools. An examination of the Catholic sisters' work throws into question many of the narratives we have told about women's literacy during this period.


History
